Ben Cohen, former England rugby winger, says Sir Elton John changed his life with the offer of hearing aids.

Rugby star Ben, who is 50% deaf in both ears, was diagnosed with his hearing loss at the peak of his career but never sought treatment because of his vigorous rugby activities. In keeping with the macho image of rugby, he simply "got on with it", which he believed even helped him on the pitch. "My communication was very good because I made sure everyone heard me. When you're loud you get past the ball more because people pass to the noisest person. That was one of my strengths."

But off the pitch, those around him couldn't ignore it so easily. "People always thought I was really rude - I could walk bast someone and they'd be speaking to me and I wouldn't pay them any attention, I just hadn't heard them!"

Cohen said: 'He [Elton John] called me, out of The rugby champion who retired from the the blue, and introduced himself. He said, "I hear you're deaf. I love the work you're doing and I'd

love to help you. When you're next in America I'm going to send you over to a hearing aid manufacturer and fit you out with new state-ofthe-art hearing aids'.

'He's a very kind man,' said Cohen about Sir Elton John. 'He does a lot of stuff that people don't realise he does and will never know because he doesn't want people to know'.

When asked if the hearing aids are of use,

I use them alot ...they've changed my life.

He adds: 'At the moment the hearing seems to have reached a plateau but we'll have to wait and see. There's no point worrying about it because it's out of my control'.

'I just hope it doesn't get worse. I want to be able to hear people'.

Acknowledging hearing loss begins with complex reactions, but the most common one is denial. Although there are many reasons why people are in denial, the bottom line is: taking that first step to get a hearing test may confirm their worst fear - that they do have a hearing loss.

There are factors that make denial logical for many people. Hearing loss often progresses slowly. People don't realize what they are missing in conversations and how many sounds they no longer hear. It is a known fact that it takes about seven years for someone to acknowledge hearing loss. They may hear well in some situations - good acoustics, quiet atmosphere without background noise, oneon-one conversations with a familiar person. Denial can be a tricky thing when that person uses it as a defense mechanism: everyone else has the problem - the world "mumbles!" But most of the time denial goes back to our society's historical "taboo" of aging.

To help your loved one move beyond denial - don't push too hard. Find out where they are having the most trouble hearing. If the TV volume becomes too loud, look into assistive listening devices for TVs. Find a phone or handset with stronger volume control if they are missing phone calls. If they can't hear the door bell, alarm clock or smoke alarm, look into visual/vibrating alerting systems. Use safety as the motivator to get them to consider taking that hearing test.

These are the first steps to get people to be aware of their hearing loss and of what they can do about it. It is important to know the other reasons for making them take a hearing test. Long-term, unchecked hearing loss can cause auditory deprivation (a condition that results in the brain "forgetting" how to hear and understand speech).

95% of people with hearing loss can be treated with hearing aids. Nine out of 10 hearing-aid users report improvements in quality of life. If you have any questions about hearing loss or hearing aids contact us at the number below and we will be only too glad to help you and your loved one.
